Phrasal Verbs With TAKE in English

PHRASAL VERBS

TAKE

- after sb**
to resemble somebody
*Your son doesn't **take after** you in any way.*
- sth back**
to return sth to its first place
*I went to the library and **took** the **books** back.*
- off**
to start flying
*The plane will **take off** in a minute.*
- on**
to accept
*Don't **take on** more than you can handle.*
- down**
to remove sth from a high position
***Take down** this book and read slowly.*
- against**
to start to dislike
*Why have you suddenly **taken against** her?*
- in**
to allow sb to stay in your home
*My house is full; I can't **take in** any more guests.*
- away**
to remove sth/sb from
***Take away** the glasses and the tray.*
- over**
to get control of sth
*He can **take over** the business when I'm away.*
- apart**
to separate sth into parts
*This crib **takes apart** for easy storage.*

Phrasal Verbs With CUT in English

PHRASAL VERBS



Cut back

Definitions; **to reduce**

Example

Government will **cut back** on defence spending.

Sentences; The

Cut off

Definitions; **to remove by cutting**

Example

overhanging branches in the garden.

off all

the

Cut down

Definitions; to use less of sth

*Example Sentences; I'm trying to **cut down** on sugar.*

Cut out

Definitions; to stop working

Example

*Sentences; There are two engines. One of them **cut out** yesterday.*

Cut up

Definitions; to cut into pieces

*Example Sentences; My mother **cut up** the onions and put them in the pot.*

Cut through

Definitions; to go through by cutting

Example

*Sentences; We **cut through** the solid rock to build the tunnel .*

Cut across

Definitions; to make a shorter route

*Example Sentences; If I **cut across** the field, it'll save time.*

Cut into

Definitions; to shortening into parts or to make sth smaller

*Example Sentences; Knives easily **cut into** the cake.*

Cut in

Definitions; to interrupt

Example

*Sentences; When you **cut in** on our conversation, we were talking.*

Phrasal Verbs With RUN in English

PHRASAL VERBS



Run along

Definition: to tell sb to go away

Example Sentence: **Run along** now, children! I'm busy.

Run down

Definition: to decline in number or size

Example Sentence: The battery has **run down**; it needs recharging.

Run on

Definition: to continue without interruption

Example Sentence: The discussion **ran on** for hours.

Run over

Definition: to look at quickly

Example Sentence: We'll just **run over** the main points again.

Run around

Definition: to be very busy doing lots of things

*Example Sentence: The child **ran around** all day in the garden*

Run against

Definition: to oppose towards sb or sth

*Example Sentence: Luck was really **running against** you yesterday!*

Run into

Definition: to be very busy doing lots of things

*Example Sentence: I've **run into** a difficulty with the project.*

Run away

Definition: to leave a place or sb

*Example Sentence: The prisoners **ran away** from the prison.*

Run across

Definition: to meet or to find unexpectedly

*Example Sentence: I **ran across** some old friends at the party.*

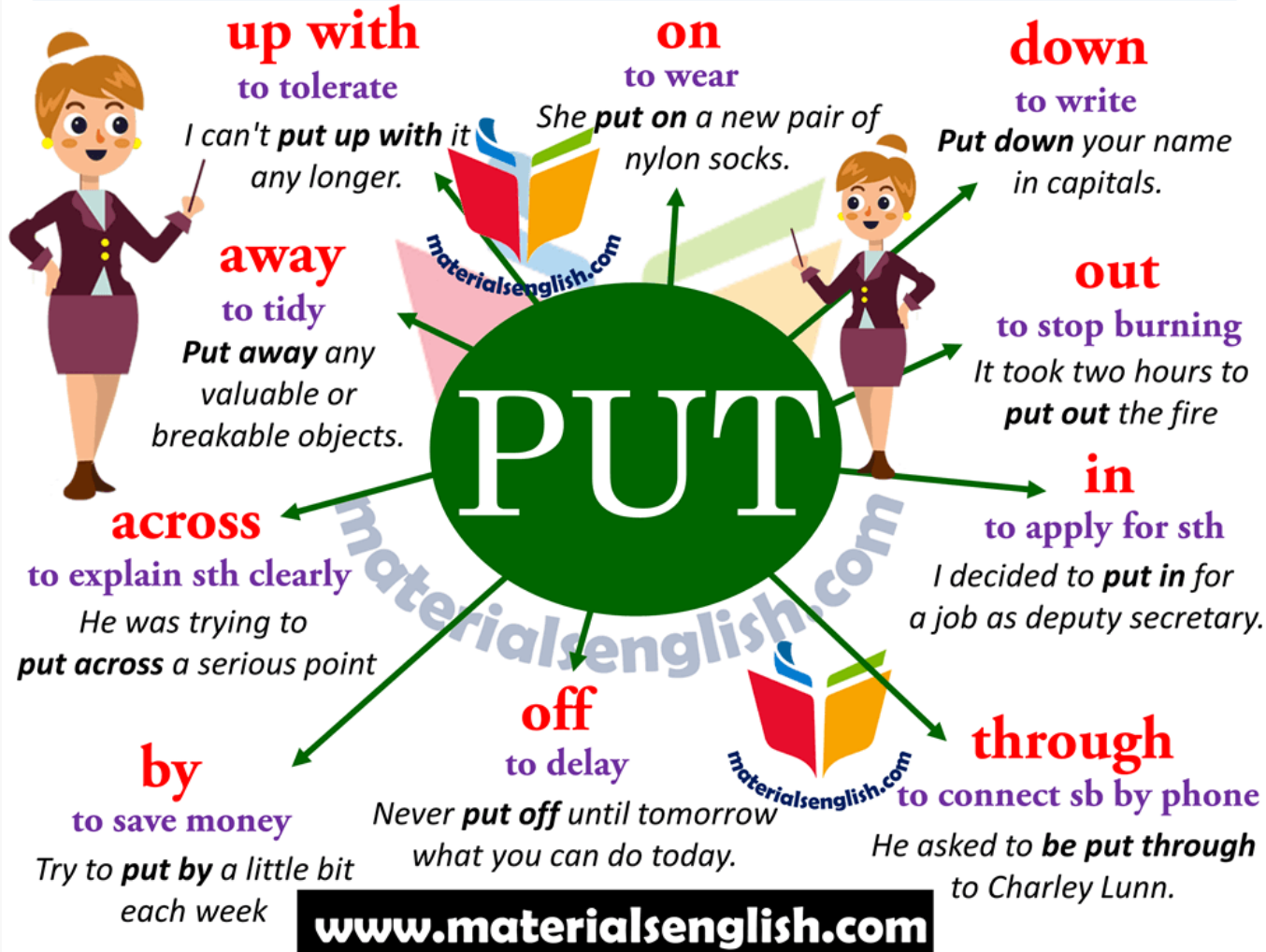
Run after

Definition: to chase

*Example Sentence: Why do dogs **run after** cats?*

Phrasal Verbs PUT in english

PHRASAL VERBS



Put up with

Definition: to tolerate

Example Sentence: I can't **put up with** it any longer.

Put on

Definition: to wear

Example Sentence: She **put on** a new pair of nylon socks.

Put down

Definition: to write

Example Sentence: **Put down** your name in capitals.

Put out

Definition: to stop burning

Example Sentence: It took two hours to **put out** the fire

Put in

Definition: to apply for sth

Example Sentence: *I decided to **put in** for a job as deputy secretary.*

Put through

Definition: to connect sb by phone

Example Sentence: *He asked to **be put through** to Charley Lunn.*

Put off

Definition: to delay

Example Sentence: *Never **put off** until tomorrow what you can do today.*

Put by

Definition: to save money

Example Sentence: *Try to **put by** a little bit each week*

Put across

Definition: to explain sth clearly

Example Sentence: *He was trying to **put across** a serious point*

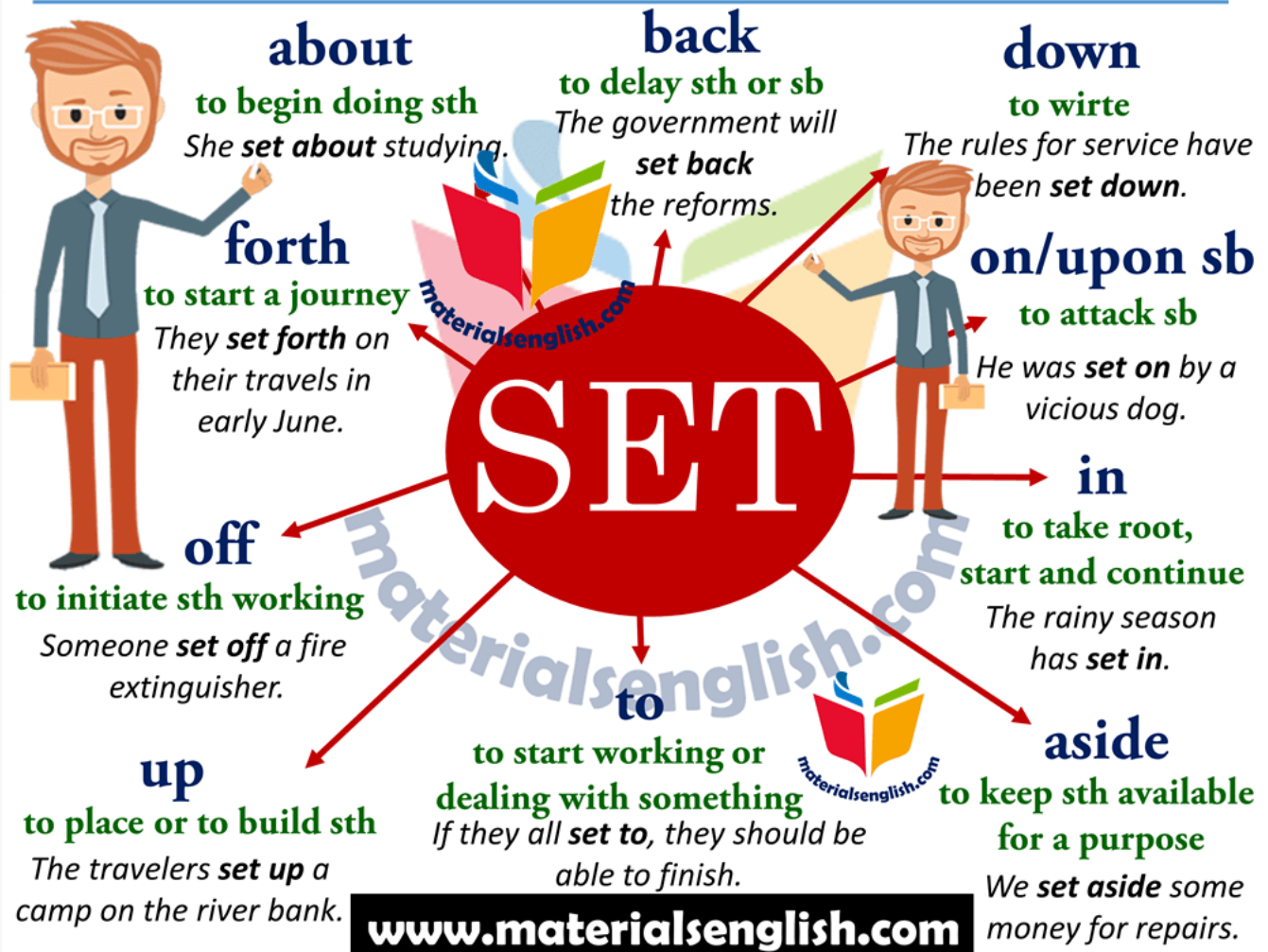
Put away

Definition: to clean up, to tidy

Example Sentence: ***Put away** any valuable or breakable objects.*

Phrasal Verbs – SET

PHRASAL VERBS



Set about

Definition: to begin doing sth

Example Sentence: She **set about** studying.

Set back

Definition: to delay sth or sb

Example Sentence: The government will **set back** the reforms.

Set down

Definition: to write

Example Sentence: The rules for service have been **set down**.

Set on/upon sb

Definition: to attack sb

Example Sentence: He was **set on** by a vicious dog.

Set in

Definition: to take root, start and continue
Example Sentence: The rainy season has **set in**.

Set aside

Definition: to keep sth available for a purpose
Example Sentence: We **set aside** some money for repairs.

Set to

Definition: to start working or dealing with something
Example Sentence: If they all **set to**, they should be able to finish.

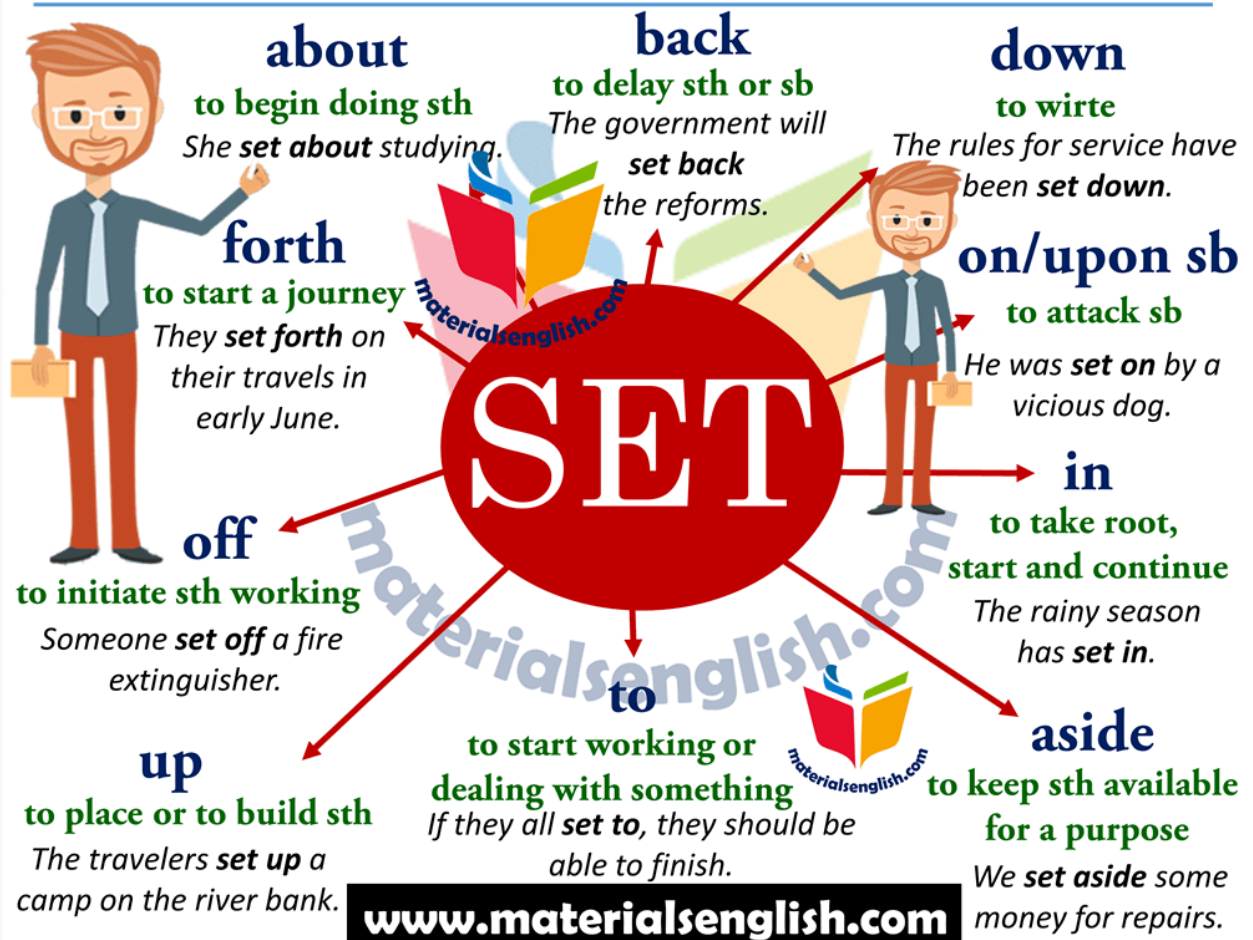
Set up

Definition: to place or to build sth
Example Sentence: The travelers **set up** a camp on the river bank.

Set off

Definition: to initiate sth working
Example Sentence: Someone **set off** a fire extinguisher.

along
to have a friendly relationship
It's impossible to get along with her.

down (to)
to give serious attention
Let's get down to work.

ahead
to be successful
He wants to get ahead in his career.

out
to become known
I don't want it to get out that I'm leaving.



over
to overcome
How would you get over that problem?

across
to make sb understand
Your meaning didn't really get across.

around
to visit lots of places
It's quite easy to get around London.

away
to escape from sb/sth
She'll get away from work as soon as she can.

(sb) down
to make sb feel sad
When my work gets me down, I want to resign.



through
to be connected by phone
I tried to call her but couldn't get through.

to pursue

The police **got after** the crooks in the city.

into

to become interested in sth

I'm **getting into** politics nowadays.

on

to have a good relationship

She **gets on** everone.

out of

to avoid

The only way of **getting out of** housework is to be ill.

back

to return to a place

Please, give me a call when you **get back**.

GET

up

to stand up

I **got up** from the chair and opened the door.

behind

to fall into arrears

If you **get behind** in your car payments, the car may be repossessed.

in

to enter a car, train, etc.

I'm inviting you to **get in** the car.

off

to leave a place

We will **get off** at 8 o'clock.

together

to meet socially

We usually **get together** once a week.

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Example Sentence: It's impossible to **get along** with her.

Get down (to)

Definition: to give serious attention

Example Sentence: Let's **get down** to work.

Get ahead

Definition: to be success

Example Sentence: He wants to **get ahead** in his career.

Get over

Definition: to overcome

Example Sentence: How would you **get over** that problem?

Get around

Definition: to visit lots of places

Example Sentence: It's quite easy to **get around** London.

Get through

Definition: to be connected by phone

Example Sentence: I tried to call her but couldn't **get through**.

Get (sb) down

Definition: to make sb feel sad

Example Sentence: When my work **gets** me **down**, I want to resign.

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Definition: to escape from sb/sth

Example Sentence: She'll **get away** from work as soon as she can.

Get across

Definition: to make sb understand
