Take on

Definitions;

to accept

Example Sentence;

Don't **take on** more than you can handle.

Take down

Definitions;

to remove sth from a high position

Example Sentence;

Take down this book and read slowly.

Take against

Definitions;

to start to dislike

Example Sentence;

Why have you suddenly taken against her?

Take in

Definitions;

to allow sb to stay in your home

Example Sentence;

My house is full; I can't **take in** any more guests.

Take away

Definitions;

to remove sth/sb from

Example Sentence;

Take away the glasses and the tray.

Definitions;

to get control of sth

Run on

Definition: to continue without interruption

Example Sentence: The discussion ran on for hours.

Run over

Definition: to look at quickly

Example Sentence: We'll just **run over** the main points again.

Run around

Definition: to be very busy doing lots of things

Example Sentence: The child **ran around** all day in the garden

Run against

Definition: to oppose towards sb or sth

Example Sentence: Luck was really running against you yesterday!

Run into

Definition: to be very busy doing lots of things

Definition: to meet or to find unexpectedly



Definition: to explain sth clearly


